

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

YOU HAVE MY PERMISSION TO PUSH!!!!

Greetings to both parents and students from the world of Upward Bound. It is 2015 already!?!!?! A brand new year to push! It is understood that "push" requires action. Webster defines the verb "push" as followed: to press against with force in order to drive or impel. When a person pushes an object, the object is forcefully moved from one location to another. Moreover, pushing is looked upon as an aggressive act. Although I do not condone violence or acts of aggression towards another individual that might cause harm, there are times in life when we are going to have to "push" our way through our day to day activities.

Pushing through periods of academic lulls requires one to aggressively wake from laziness, boredom, or apathy in order to achieve the A or B in a subject that may challenge us. Beginning in the month of December, the Upward Bound staff had to push ourselves to do an accurate job on our Annual Performance Report (APR). The APR is a federal report that requires us to report on each student Upward Bound served since 2008. It was a very tedious, arduous process but we pushed our way through it. However, from this report we learned we have much work to do. Out of all of the objectives, we did not achieve three. One of the three was due to not having students who graduated from high school and attend college in 2008; yet, two out of the three are objectives we are going to have to tackle. These objectives were 80% of our students maintaining a grade point average of 2.5 or above and the other is 75% of our students achieving a proficient in Reading/Language Arts and Math state assessments. We did not meet these objectives; therefore, we are going to have to push ourselves, students, and parents in order for us to meet and/or exceed our goals.

I encourage each of you to attend tutoring on Tuesday or Thursday of each week as well as your scheduled events/activities and senior meetings. We appreciate and thank each of you for doing your part and remember in order to end strong by the end of the school year, each of you may have to PUSH YOURSELVES!!!!!

P.S. As the Upward Bound Director, I would like to welcome Ms. JoAnn Webber to our Upward Bound family. She officially started on December 4th and we are blessed to have her as a part of our team.

The 50th Anniversary of Upward Bound is a cause for great celebration. On December 6th, Kentucky State University Upward Bound commemorated the proud history of TRIO's "First Program" and asserted our accomplishments. Upward Bound projects across the country shared with their institutions and communities the valuable contributions that Upward Bound has made in the lives of low-income and/or first-generation students.

FAST FACTS

- Since 1964, more than 2 million students have participated in Upward Bound.
- In 1964, 17 Pilot programs were funded, 2,061 students participated.
- In 1964, approximately 1,500 Upward Bound students graduated high school; 80% were admitted to college in 1965 and 69% graduated with a bachelor's degree.
- Today, 964 programs are funded with more than 80,000 students participating.
- The likelihood of Upward Bound students going to college immediately after graduation increases by persistence in the program from 77% at two years to 93% at three or more years.
- A student from top quartile of family income is nine times more likely to earn a bachelor's degree than a student born into the bottom quartile -73.3% compared to 8.3%.

Upward Bound Students Reason to "Succeed" while in High School: Scholarships


The Academic Scholarship Program at Kentucky State University is designed to recognize and reward students who have exemplified academic excellence. Scholarships are awarded by the Admissions Office to entering students who have not completed a bachelor's degree program. Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis and many are renewable for subsequent semesters. Scholarship awards are based upon a number of criteria including cumulative grade point average (4.0 scale) composite ACT or SAT scores and acceptance into the university.

When reading the statistics for first generation and low income Students, it can look very discouraging. However, I'm not discouraged, I'm encouraged and excited! Why excited? Why encouraged? Because "you are somebody special and you can do ALL things, if you put your mind to it and apply yourself!!!"

Below are techniques that can help our students to overcome:

- Parental Support Get involved in your child's academics!
 Checking their grades, contact their teachers, make sure they are involved in clubs and organizations, make sure they are studying for the ACT/SAT or other Standardized Test, and making sure they are completing homework and class assignments.
- Encourage them- Build your child up. Speak positive words over them and to them. For example, "You can achieve a 21 and above on the ACT." "I know you can obtain a 3.0 GPA and above."

- Upward Bound Take advantage of the resources, workshops, college trips and cultural events that Upward Bound offers. Continue to check your email and mail for Upward Bound updates, scholarship and opportunities.
- 4. Community Outreach- Look for community mentoring programs to enroll your child in, so they can receive positive enrichment from an outside source. In addition, allow your child to enroll in community service projects, of which will afford them an opportunity to give back to their community.
- Expect the Best- Always expect the best from your child!
 Setting high expectations shows your child that you have faith in them and they are more than capable to be successful academically.
