

Upward Bound will be hosting its summer program for the second year on the campus of Kentucky State University. The dates are tentatively set for June 22-July 17th. Students will receive instruction in core subjects including Math, Science, English as well as Computer Applications and Foreign Language. Helping the students to get into college which is our main goal.


Is there anything else you would like us to know?

WORKSTUDY PROGRAM





Academics With Attitude I GOT A NEW ATTITUDE

In the 1980's a popular song was released by Patti LaBelle entitled, A New Attitude. Check out some of the lyrics:

> I'm feelin' good from my head to my shoes Know where I'm goin' and I know what to do I tidied up my point of view I got a new attitude Runnin' hot, runnin' cold I was runnin' into overload It was extreme, ex-ex-ex-ex-extreme It took it so high, so low So low, there was nowhere to go Like a dream

Somehow the wires uncrossed, the tables were turned Never knew I had such a lesson to learn I'm feelin' good from my head to my shoes Know where I'm goin' and I know what to do I tidied up my point of view I got a new attitude

In this song, Labelle was proclaiming to the world that she had been through some difficult circumstances; however, through the midst of her trials she learned to develop a new attitude. This leads me to the next question. How does one define the word "attitude"? Dictionary.com defines attitude as a state of mind, feeling, and/or disposition. A person's attitude can be seen both positively and negatively. As in Labelle's song, her positive outlook on her circumstances helped her to develop a new

During the third term, most Upward Bound students witnessed their grades take a huge nose dive compared to the first and second term. There could be several explanations as to why this occurred; yet, a huge reason can be due to the development of a negative outlook upon one's academics. This outlook can be attributed to burn-out, stress, pessimism, and/or low confidence in one's abilities.
